Kingston Seymour Parish Council

The Parish Council met on the 13th July 26 and discussed the following matters.

Roads

Many will have noticed that the corner at New Cut Bow had been damaged again but hopefully, by the time you read this, NSC will have restored the concrete blocks to their rightful place!

The parish council also discussed the spate of emergency road closures that we suffered in late March and early May, we have requested that NSC make additional signage available on such occasions so that we all knew how far down Ham Lane one could travel before finding the closure! NSC have stated that because the three incidents were all “emergencies,” that the utility companies involved who are individually responsible for the signage had to prioritise fixing the problems. We will continue to monitor this issue and ensure once future works are completed, that signage is removed promptly.

A number of road surface issues have been “*painted round*” recently, and we are establishing where these stand in the overall timetable, we are conscious that many road works in the district have already been delayed because of the hot weather.

Village Facilities

We will undertake our annual cut of roadside hedges in September; this will give us the best chance of our lanes being safe through the autumn. We are proceeding with the refurbishment of our fingerpost, and it will be missing from the Triangle for about three weeks whilst it is repainted and the new Back Lane “finger” is installed. The base of the sign will be repainted when these “*white bits*” return. Work on the bus shelter should get underway in the school holidays.

Bristol Airport

The latest planning application has been lodged and there are hundreds of documents and (*literally*) thousands of comments associated with it – and all are visible on the NSC website – search for application **26/P/0686/OU2**.

This application is different from the previous ones in that it seeks to expand the overall area taken up by the airport for the extended runway, more aircraft stands and other facilities. Our parish council is a member of the Parish Council Airport Association (along with 27 other local councils in North Somerset and B&NES) and a substantial and detailed Planning Objection has been lodged by the PCAA and is amongst the documents available to view. On behalf of our parish, we will be lodging an objection on the grounds of the increased footprint, increased noise, traffic, parking issues and the suggested compulsory purchase of common land.

You are welcome to lodge your own comments against the application, be they for, or against, the proposal.

NSC Local Plan

After many iterations, NSC have submitted the Local Plan to 2041 to the planning inspectorate for approval, which is considered to be fully in accordance with the set of Government demands that are now in place.

Separately, you may have heard about *“The Yatton Decision”* handed down in the High Court which appears to permit the building of new properties on a flood risk area in Yatton. Our MP, Tessa Munt, is challenging this ruling in parliament as it could set a precedent for developers to build in completely inappropriate areas nationwide.

Finance

The parish council has satisfied all the audit checks for the 2025-26 financial year and the formal period of public examination of the accounts has now ended. The material is all on our website and if you do have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact me.

I’m pleased to say that the parish council is now “live” on – fully secured - online banking, which is good news particularly for me, as our bankers, Nat West, had closed our original branch at Clevedon and have recently also closed the one they moved us to at Portishead! We currently have £9.4k in general funds and £7.2k earmarked for War Memorial repairs. We are due an inspection on the War Memorial shortly and as it is a Grade II listed structure for which we are responsible, we will engage specialist repairers should issues be identified and raised with us.

As always, you are welcome to attend any meeting of the Parish Council and the agendas and minutes of all the Council's meetings together with other community news and information are carried on our website kingstonseymourparish.gov.uk . Rules & Handy Tips for Exhibitors:

As always please READ THE RULES before entering:

1. No entries can be accepted on the day. Please help us by returning your entry forms by 24th August 2025.
2. If a measurement is quoted in the class description, please check as the judges will.
3. All items of cookery to be covered in clingfilm/ plastic bag.
4. Fill clear plain jars to the top to allow cooled jams etc to settle to ¼" from top of jar. Cover with airtight tops. Lids must be new or use paper tops. Pickles – new screw tops, no wax.
5. Staging of exhibits to be completed by 10.30am.
6. All garden exhibits (excluding flower arrangements) to be grown & tended by the exhibitor.
7. No more than two entries per person per class.

Here's a list of handy tips for exhibitors:

1. Uniformity of size is most important when showing vegetables and fruits.
2. Fruit & vegetables should not be polished. The natural 'bloom' should be left on all fruit, tomatoes or cucumbers.
3. Tomatoes, all fruits and beans should be exhibited with their stalks.
4. Show the name of preserves and the date made.
5. Eggs should be even in size and uniform in colour You have no control over which egg will be cracked open but hope that the yolk will be a perfect yellow and sit up on the albumen which should be neatly surrounding.
6. Photographs should be taken by the exhibitor therefore the exhibitor should not appear in it.

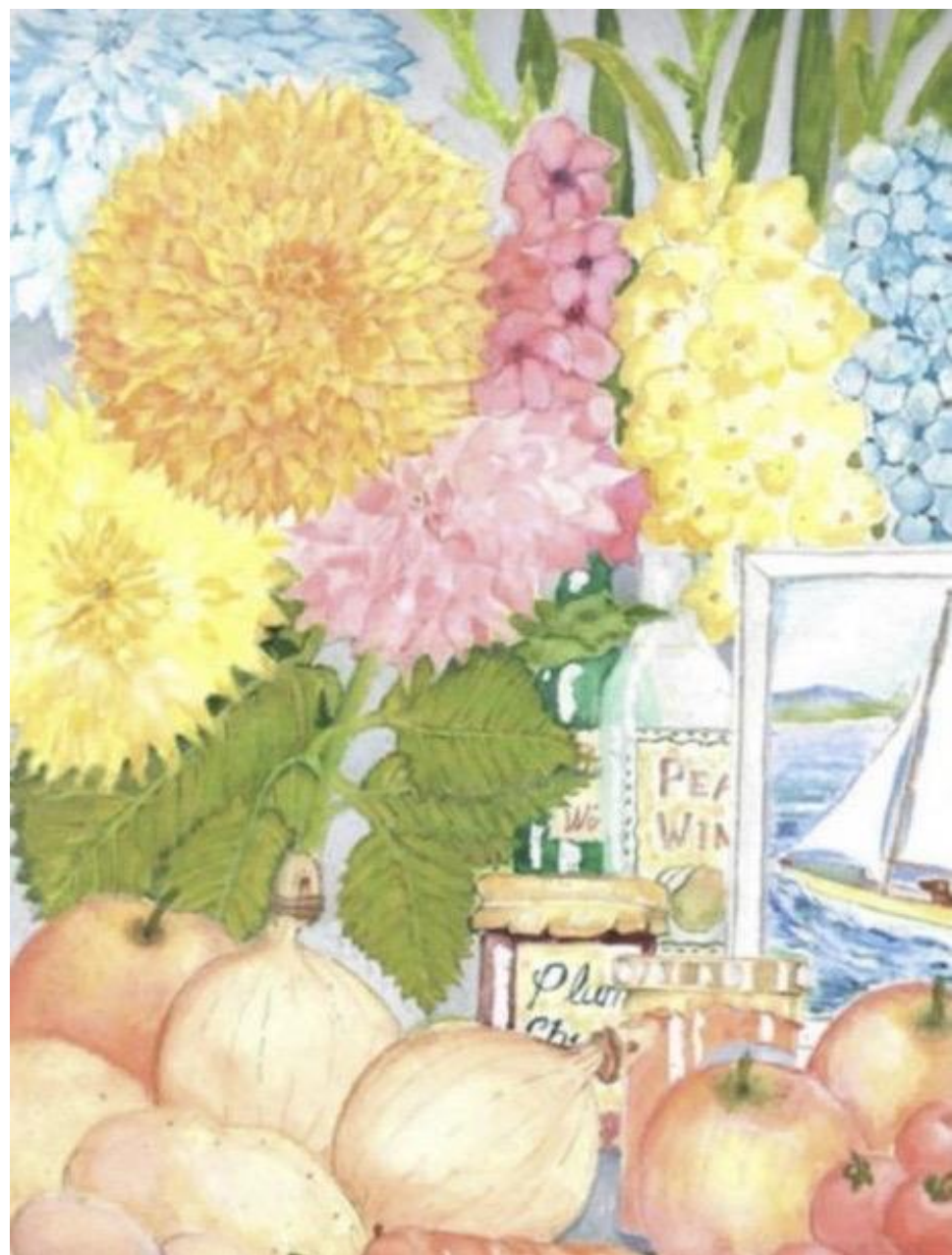

Wayne Sparks



Wayne was a true countryman from the Mendips, with a huge and generous heart. His whole life revolved around farming and after school in East Harptree, Chew Valley, and College, Wayne joined the Chew Valley Young Farmers club, which gave him the opportunity to make like minded friends in this rural agricultural community, plus learn new life skills and have a thoroughly good social time.

Wayne's career in agriculture was diverse and ranged from dairy farming to contracting. As a key member of the Alvis contracting team, Wayne's skills were eclectic. He was able to operate some of the largest agricultural machines and navigate the advanced technology. As well as living in Kingston Seymour, he would often be seen working in and around the village particularly during the silaging and other harvesting seasons. Wayne was hugely admired and respected by farmers far and wide. He knew their fields, and his work ethic and attention to detail was second to none. Even when poorly, Wayne would arrive at 3am to work at the Bristol University farm feeding livestock, and then do a full day contracting.

Dear Wayne became seriously ill in the spring of 2025 and after surgery and a great deal of medical intervention, we were all hopeful that he would be spending extended time with his beautiful wife Zoe and dear Olivia, only 4 years old.

Zoe and Wayne were married here in All Saints Church in May 2019, when Wayne joined one of the oldest families in the village. Seawall Farm was farmed by Zoe's great-grandfather, Harold Wallis, and the farm is now run by the Kostyla family, who continue the family's long tradition of dairy farming.

Wayne was always ready to tackle a challenge, whether for amusement with friends or for work or other reasons, and I am told by his friends that he would keep them on 'the straight and narrow'. He had integrity and he valued fairness and equality. He was content. He had a close relationship with his own family. He was loyal and family was a key priority. He was constantly concerned about the well being of others. Wayne maintained traditional values. It was important to him that he provided stability and security for Zoe and Olivia, He deeply treasured them both.

This strong willed, courageous, humble and selfless, gentle man will always be remembered by his many, many friends particularly in the farming community.

Wayne died peacefully at home, Seawall Farm on the 28th June 2026. He was 43 years old. We offer our love and deepest condolences to Zoe, Olivia and all of the members of the Kostyla and Sparks families.

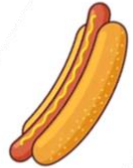

Update from Tessa Munt, MP for Kingston Seymour



It's been a couple of busy months! Locally, I was honoured to meet the many volunteers when the land newly acquired by YACWAG (Yatton & Congresbury Wildlife Action Group) was 'opened'. Lots of people attended the event despite

the rain, and we had a fab time marking a significant milestone in the life of YACWAG.

I caught up with many locals at YATT Fest people, meeting Mike and Zoe from Avon & Somerset Police; serving cider with Tom and Henry in the Thatchers' box; and helping Virginia's team in the Strawberry Line Café & Community Cycle Hire tent – all good fun! I also attended Yatton Schools Carnival – what a brilliant event! There was amazing football on display, and it was great to catch up with the team from The Note Warehouse, one of my lovely surgery venues.

In Westminster, I met Lord Timpson, the Prisons' Minister to discuss the case of a man who has been locked up for 38 years, 22 years longer than his sentence - but hasn't been released because he maintains he is innocent. I've met Stephen Timms, Minister for Social Security & Disability about problems with the Access to Work Scheme which supports those with a disability or health condition to start or stay in work; and I've met Polly Miller-Perkins, the first ever Armed Forces Commissioner.

In Parliament, I requested a debate about 'the Yatton decision' - an extraordinary High Court decision which will allow building on flood plains, filed two amendments to the Health Bill relating to the new 'Single Patient Record', and to following NICE 2021 guidelines which the NHS has implemented inconsistently, leading to a 'postcode lottery' for patients with ME. In Committee, I voted for a 'minority report' on the Courts & Tribunals Bill as the Government is set to remove the centuries-old right to a Jury trial in many cases. I also spoke in the debate about Child Sexual Offender Data.

I've asked questions about:

- * protecting agricultural land to ensure our food security into the future
- * speeding up free court transcripts for victims
- * the low mileage rates paid to those undertaking Jury Service
- * potential breaches of export trade regulations for waste tyres
- * huge business rate hikes for rural micro and small businesses
- * when and by whom the records relating to the June 1994 Chinook air crash were sealed for 100 years
- * long delays to the compensation scheme for victims of the medical 'mesh' scandal
- * whether new Police training to increase understanding of state threats should be extended to 'front line' health, job centre and social services staff
- * the legacy of the Northern Ireland 'Troubles' Bill
- * habitual waste of NHS expertise, resources, time and taxpayers' money providing unsuitable wheelchairs for patients which then have to be replaced
- * contracting newly qualified dentists to work in the NHS for at least three years
- * the lack of funds for the Music and Dance Scheme which benefits young people from less privileged backgrounds
- * Priddy Folk Festival's supply of water from Bristol Water and its contractor, Aquam
- * repayment of overpaid tax from HMRC which can't be cashed as they're in the wrong name
- * quashing convictions for victims of child sex abuse who have been coerced into criminal activity
- * the use of shell companies and flags to disguise Russian shadow fleet activities and evade sanctions
- * introducing a 'right to be forgotten' to ensure that children's data footprints are destroyed on request
- * a local company waiting months to be paid for defence and security work relating to submarine disposal
- * the lack of a special 'rural' mileage allowance for mobility vehicle users who travel great distances to access health and care facilities in rural areas
